

2022 ANNUAL REPORT

Cat Adoption Team's mission is to save the lives of homeless cats and to work with our community to provide feline expertise and quality programs and services for people and cats. Here are a few of the ways we carried out this mission in 2022.

In March, CAT returned to more typical operations compared to the first two years of the pandemic. As a result, we sent nearly 3,200 kittens and cats to loving homes — our highest number of adoptions since 2019. Other accomplishment from 2022 include developing a new strategic plan to guide our work over the next three years; progress on diversity, equity, and inclusion goals; providing hundreds more spay/neuter surgeries than average; a major investment in staff through a compensation package; and improving our support for cats aged 8 and older by fully implementing all aspects of the Aleece Runge Fund for Senior Cats.

This fantastic success is thanks to the ongoing efforts of our entire CAT family, including amazing people like you.

COMMUNITY SUPPORT

The CAT Helpline offers guidance, advice, and resources to anyone who contacts Cat Adoption Team for assistance with rehoming a cat or who is seeking support to help them keep their pet cat. In a small number cases, CAT Helpline counselors may refer a client to our Keeping Cats in Homes Fund (KCIH). Through KCIH, CAT can sometimes provide or help cover the costs of emergency boarding, medical care, and related support in crisis cases.

Providing this type of help ensures that a pet cat receives care they may need—such as an urgent surgery or short-term foster—while remaining a part of the family they know and love.

The CAT Helpline and KCIH programs make it possible for more pets to stay out of the shelter and with their people.


